

movement for Black lives and nation- read by the students. wide protests sparked questions from students in Milestones classes about The Milestones Declaration of Rights and inequality, systemic racism and violence.

Following the students' lead, Milestones teachers facilitated discussions of these topics, no matter how difficult some of them were. "Many of the questions were around 'Why are people being treated this way?' and 'What can be done to stop it," said teacher Liana Marks. The classes also reflected on how those with disabilities have historically been treated and what has changed for the better, and what work there is still to do.

Out of these conversations came a written Declaration of Rights by the students that is centered around the topics of respect, safety, recognition, identity and equality.

The students and teachers knew it was important to share this declaration with the larger community. Over the summer, the teachers painted the Declaration on the front windows of the Inclusive Community Center in Hadley, where they joined a window stating, "In Solidarity with Black Lives Matter." Throughout the summer, students dropped by to read the lines of their Declaration, and many are featured in the video of the project.






