For a week in June, the fourth floor of the Massachusetts State House featured 20 stunning black and white portraits of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, all part of the award-winning *Portraits of Pathlight* project.

The exhibit was hosted by Senator Jo Comerford, and she and Representative Lindsay Sabadosa co-hosted a reception in honor of Pathlight and the portraits at the end of the week. A busload of people from Pathlight, including some of the photographers and portrait subjects, traveled to Boston to tour the State House, see the exhibit, and attend the reception.

The event garnered attention from prominent figures such as Health and Human Services Secretary Kate Walsh and Department of Developmental Services Commissioner Jane Ryder. Both attended the show and reception, using their voices to acknowledge the vital work done by Pathlight and the individuals we serve.

“Too often we see that people with disabilities are pushed to the edge of the frame or are viewed through a sentimental filter that oversimplifies the fullness of the person,” said Valle Dwight, Pathlight’s director of Development and Communications. “At Pathlight we believe that the

people we serve are the directors of their own dreams and goals, and they are front and center as the stars in all we do.”

Dollars for scholars

Each year in honor of Pathlight's former Executive Director Donald Fletcher, Pathlight awards a \$5,000 scholarship to one staff member to further their education at the undergraduate or graduate level. This scholarship is in addition to the tuition reimbursement included in the benefits package.

This year's winner is **Gina Vona, a licensed practical nurse at Pathlight's High Meadow house.** She graduated in May 2023 from Vermont University with an Associate's degree in nursing.

"Nursing has always been a natural career choice for me, driven by an innate desire to help others and make a meaningful difference in their lives," Gina wrote in her scholarship application. She plans to continue her education at Capella University, beginning in October 2023, to earn a BS in nursing.

Pathlight's Executive Director John Roberson and Director of Nursing Mariame Kounta presented Gina with

her award at the High Meadow house in Hadley surrounded by her coworkers.

"The scholarship provided by Pathlight is not just financial aid but a catalyst for my personal and professional growth as a Registered Nurse," Gina said. "By investing in my education, I will be better prepared to excel in my role at Pathlight and contribute positively to the ever-evolving field of nursing. Pathlight's Board of Directors announced in July that Executive Director John Roberson has left Pathlight to return to CHD, where he previously worked for 33 years, in pursuit of a better work/life balance that aligns with his family and career aspirations.

During his time with us, John played an indispensable role in Pathlight's achievements, including CARF accreditation, OQE licensing and certification, and securing an award to continue providing residential services through the Department of Developmental Services. These milestones ensure that Pathlight can continue delivering high-quality services to the individuals we serve.

The Board named Keith Kendall, a seasoned interim Executive Director, to steer us through this transitional

period. As the Board embarks on the search for a permanent Director, Keith will work closely with the leadership team and the Executive Committee of the Board. This collaboration ensures that day-to-day operations run seamlessly, and the organization remains stabilized, prepared to welcome our next permanent Executive Director.

That search will likely take six to nine months and the board has engaged a search firm to prepare for the upcoming search.
